#### NEXT FISCHER REPORT ON LIBRARY EXPENDITURES TO START DATA PHASE

CCL has once again commissioned Russ Fischer to produce his invaluable report on California community college library expenditures. The Fischer Report continues to serve as the only available source of comparative and longitudinal data about library expenditures. Data collection forms and information will be mailed directly to Library Directors by Russ Fischer. Prompt return allows for earlier publication!

#### CCL BOARD TACKLES 94-96 WORKPLAN PROJECTS

The CCL Board continues to move forward on pieces of the Workplan by initiating work on the following projects:

PROGRAM REVIEW MODEL: Ed Kleppinger (Mission), Diana Gonzalez (Antelope Valley), and Gregg Atkins (San Mateo) will begin work on the draft will presented at the California Gold conference in March (and mailed to each Chief Librarian at the same time). TIMELINE: A revised document will be mailed out in late September, and comments will be invited from the field.

LEGISLATIVE PLAN: The CCL Board reviewed the existing Ed Code and Title 5 sections to identify all pieces which apply to ce libraries at its July 95 meeting, and has developed a preliminary revision of the Ed Code sections. TIMELINE: The Board will adopt a final version at its September meeting. The proposed revision will then be published in the CCL Outlook, and comments will be invited from the field.

ELECTRONIC ACCESS: The CCL Board agreed to pursue development of electronic access via the Internet to CCL documents, announcements, and the CCL Outlook. The most likely scenario is to use an established site (such as the Cerritos Gopher) or to join with another group just setting up a site (such as CARL). The Board agreed that electronic access needed to include the capability for users to post questions and communicate with CCL representatives. The Board also agreed that such electronic access could not immediately replace print formats.

### DIABLO VALLEY LIBRARY GETS NOD FOR PROGRAM

A Diablo Valley College Library instructional program for Basic Skills and ESL students has been recognized with an Honorable Mention as part of this year's Board of Governors Exemplary Award Program. There were two statewide winners and four honorable mentions for the award this year. Carol Bartlett, part-time librarian at DVC Library, developed the Basic Skills and ESL Workbook and continues to coordinate the program.

#### CCL APPOINTS REP TO CC TELECOMMUNICATIONS TASK FORCE; PLAN DUE FOR OCTOBER REVIEW

In a focused effort to complete a comprehensive, forward-looking telecommunications plan for the California Community Colleges, a special task force was convened over the summer to work with a consultant and Chancellor's Office staff. Following comment and review at an October conference, the plan will be presented to the Board of Governors for adoption. This would complete the work involved with the \$200,000 planning grant received from the U.S. Department of Commerce. The adopted plan then becomes the basis for a full-scale grant application for funds to implement the proposed framework. State budget funding may also be available to implement the plan.

Organizations such as CCL were invited to name appointees to the task force and help insure input from the library/LRC arena; CCL named Will Baty, Library Director at Santa Rosa. Will's expertise and leadership in library automation, Internet use, telecommunications and distance learning are a perfect match to the work of the group. Following an initial June meeting, work groups were formed which "met" via conference calls and worked with the aid of fax and Internet connections. The October 4, 1995 conference is open to all interested parties; a copy of the information sheet and registration form is on pages 3-4. A review of the plan will appear in the next CCL Outlook.

# What the on-line world really needs is an old-fashioned librarian

N the 1957 movie "Desk Set," Katharine Hepburn played a research librarian for a fictional television network and Spencer Tracy played a computer systems engineer who sets up a room-sized computer that the librarians fear will eliminate their jobs. A telephone call comes asking whether the King of the Watusis owns an automobile. The question is fed into the computer, and out comes a lengthy movie review of "King Solomon's Mines."

This sounds like what happens today using the search techniques available on the World Wide Web. "The state of information retrieval on the Internet is equivalent to what librarians were doing in the 1950s," says Christine Borgman, chairwoman of the Department of Library and Information Science at UCLA. "The on-line world is chaotic."

And librarians may yet play a big part in sorting it all out. Too often regarded as shy spinsters in boring, low-paying jobs, librarians are an untapped source of innovation and expertise in an age when everyone talks about information overload but nobody does anything about it.

Certainly, computer scientists don't seem to be making a lot of progress in helping us find information needles in digital haystacks — and some say they never will. At a recent conference called "Society and the Future of Computing," sponsored by Los Alamos National Laboratory, Phil Agre, a computer scientist at UC San Diego, provocatively announced that "computer science is dead."

Agre went on to explain that while progress in operating systems and processor speeds can be expected to continue, these technologies are no longer the bottlenecks of the computer revolution. What's needed today is a better understanding of how to organize and present information, and how people use that in-

formation once they have it.

The focus of research should shift, said Agre, to social scientists, psychologists and librarians — to people instead of machines. Computer scientists, he noted, tend to think of what's in a computer as data rather than information. They need the help of librarians, who have been organizing information since the Egyptian dynasties.

"What bothers me most," says Borgman, "is that computer people seem to think that if you have access to the Web, you don't need libraries. But what's on the Web now is just a fraction of what's in an average-sized research library." And what's on the Web is a mess. There is nothing even approaching the information-organization systems librarians have developed, such as the Machine Readable Cataloguing system, called "Mark," that allows libraries to share data and documents worldwide without confusion.

One key problem with the information available on the Internet is that standards of classification are almost always added to electronic documents after the fact, instead of being built in from the start. Librarians use standards that are universal, and the material they shelve, or put on-line, uses codes that are the same everywhere — the Dewey Decimal System, ISBN numbers and classifications from the Library of Congress.

The anarchic Internet contains

no such standards, and thus search mechanisms are forced to look for keywords in unstructured data, typically producing the equivalent of the "King Solomon's Mines" movie review.

As a solution, computer scientists are keen on developing "agents," software sleuths that will search the Net for whatever a user is looking for and retrieve it: Apple Computer has dubbed its experimental Net searcher "Cyberdog." But these agents, most of which are primitive, will be far more effective if the information on the Net is rationally organized. Librarians are already working on how to link the Web's standard coding language, HTML, to structured systems of information retrieval.

One reason librarians are largely neglected as a rich source of information expertise undoubtedly lies in our common stereotypes of librarians and our attitudes about libraries. While the Internet is widely touted as the greatest invention since fire and cyberspace is hyped as the next frontier, libraries are struggling.

Borgman believes that librarians will nonetheless become increasingly important in the information economy. Right now, a Web user can't tell the difference, looking at a search query result, between a "vanity page" and something truly valuable.

This is the role librarians have always served, says Borgman: identifying, selecting, cataloguing, and preserving a culture's treasured ideas. The job is getting more complicated, but what librarians have accomplished in 5,000 years we often take for granted.

In "Desk Set," the happy ending is that Spencer Tracy's big computer, Emerac, is saved from folly by the librarians. Let's hope we have the same experience.

Strategic Telecommunications Plan Review Conference

Synopsis: On October 4, 1995, the Chancellor's Office will conduct the California Community Colleges Strategic Telecommunications Plan Review Conference. This conference is designed to be a one-day, drivein, fly-in event and will be held at the Hyatt Regency Hotel, Irvine.

As you may recall from previous correspondence, we are developing a systemwide strategic telecommunications plan. These activities are being supported through a variety of state and federal funding sources. A telecommunications planning grant from the U.S. Department of Commerce, has allowed the Chancellor's Office to retain the consulting services of Spectrum Telecom Systems (STS):

The purpose of the Strategic Telecommunications Plan Review Conference is to provide a forum for California Community Colleges, State of California agencies, related organizations, and business/industry, to review and comment on the draft of the Strategic Telecommunications Plan for the California Community Colleges. The input received from participants at this conference will help to refine the draft Strategic Telecommunications Plan scheduled for its first review on November 16, 1995, by the California Community Colleges Board of Governors.

Through the STS planning process, we have now engaged more than sixty two individuals from twenty eight community college organizations and Chancellor's Office staff in a series of seven highly structured task forces. These task forces have been assigned to focus on technical, user application and functional aspects of the planning process. The formal

name of this field based group is the Telecommunications Advisory Committee (TAC). It is expected that the October conference will be the capstone in the planning process allowing an even larger group of community college constituents and interested parties to review the work of the consultants and the Advisory Committee in the form of a draft of the Strategic Telecommunications Plan for the California Community Colleges.

Conference attendees will participate in a day-long schedule of break-out sessions that will include the presentation of a comprehensive analysis of the plan's components, a question-and-answer period, and an invitation for written comments.

Action Requested: Enclosed with this letter is a conference registration form which may be duplicated as needed. To keep costs low, the registration fee has been set at \$25 per person and includes the cost of meals and beverages. Registration forms are due in the Chancellor's Office by September 11, 1995.
